



A few years ago a group of salesmen went to a re-
gional sales convention in Chicago. They had assured
their families that they would be home in plenty of

The 16 year old girl was totally blind! She was softly crying, tears running down
her cheeks in frustration, and at the same time helplessly groping for her spilled pro-
duce as the crowd swirled about her, no one stopping, and no one to care for her
plight. The salesman knelt on the floor with her, gathered up the apples, put them
into the baskets, and helped set the display up once more. As he did this, he noticed
that many of them had become battered and bruised; these he set aside in another
basket. When he had finished, he pulled out his wallet and said to the girl, "Here,
please take this \$20 for the damage we did. Are you okay?"

She nodded through her tears. He continued on with, "I hope we didn't spoil
your day too badly."

As the salesman started to walk away, the bewildered blind girl called out to
him, "Mister..." He paused and turned to look back into those blind eyes. She contin-
ued, "Are you Jesus?"

He stopped in mid-stride, and he wondered. Then slowly he made his way to
catch the later flight with that question burning and bouncing about in his soul: "Are
you Jesus?"

Dear Friends,

Do people mistake you for Jesus?

That's our destiny, is it not? To be so much like Jesus that people cannot tell the dif-
ference as we live and interact with a world that is often blind to His love, life and grace.

If we claim to know Him, we should live, walk and act as He would. Knowing Him
is more than simply quoting Scripture and going to daily Mass.

It's actually living the Word as life unfolds day to day.

You are the apple of His eye even though we, too,
have been bruised by a fall. He stopped what He
was doing and picked you and me up on a hill called
Calvary and paid in full for our damaged fruit.

Let us live like we are worth the price He paid.

Jesus!

MORAL GUIDES FOR CATHOLICS – PRECEPTS OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

My dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On Wednesday, 22 February 2012, Christians throughout the world embark onto the sacred season of Lent. Lent is that annual period when we recall our sinful human nature and seek penance and reconciliation in order to better prepare ourselves to celebrate the gift of our redemption – the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ during the Sacred Triduum. We are asked to seek forgiveness from God and from one another by the traditional means of extra almsgiving, fasting and abstinence, and better communication with God through extra time in prayer. Usually we review our lives in relation to the moral order given to us through the Ten Commandments and the Beatitudes. Another guide that I find quite useful for those under my pastoral ministry and myself are the Precepts of the Church. These will be the basis of my next several articles in *Fraternally Yours*.

I recall being taught The Precepts of the Church when I was educated about them in the fifth grade through the tool of *The Baltimore Catechism*. Unlike the Decalogue and the Beatitudes, the Precepts are of human origin and not divine. *The Catechism of the Catholic Church* states that, “The precepts of the Church are set in the context of a moral life bound to and nourished by liturgical life. The obligatory character of these positive laws decreed by the pastoral authorities is meant to guarantee to the faithful the indispensable minimum in the spirit of prayer and moral effort, in the growth in love of God and neighbor” [paragraph 2041]. I note that the *Catechism* states that the precepts are the “indispensable minimum of prayer and moral effort”. How much more we are able to do only brings about more saving graces in the life of the Catholic! Each one of us has the ability to do more according to our state of life.

Paragraph 2042 lists the Precepts of the Church. “The first precept (‘You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation.’) requires the faithful to participate in the Eucharistic celebration when the Christian community gathers together on the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord.” You may recall that I previously wrote an article about the observance of Sunday in the March 2010 issue of *Fraternally Yours*. My series that year was based on the Decalogue and the Third Commandment “Remember the Sabbath Day, to keep it holy” was the subject in that issue. In a sentence the thrust of the article was to participate in the Eucharistic Liturgy, to avoid unnecessary work on that day of the week, enjoy the company of family and friends and to participate in works of charity. In this Precept of the Church, the thrust is placed on the participation in the Eucharistic Liturgy. Why is this so important for us Catholics?

The Eucharistic Celebration is the center of the Christian life for through it the Word that is proclaimed and the words of Jesus that transforms the bread into the Body of Christ and the wine into the Blood of Christ afford us the hope of eternal life. For Jesus himself tells us, “He who feeds on my flesh and drinks my blood has life eternal and I will raise him up on the last day. For my flesh is real food and my blood real drink. The man who feeds on my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him. Just as the Father who has life sent me and I have life because of the Father, so the man who feeds on me will have life because of me” (John 6:54-57).

All of the Gospels give an account of the Last Supper but the oldest account of the Institution of the Eucharist is handed down to us from *Saint Paul’s First Letter to the Corinthians*. In that Letter, Paul gives us a portrait of the

earliest Eucharistic Celebrations of the Christian community. He writes, “I received from the Lord what I handed on to you, namely, that the Lord Jesus on the night in which he was betrayed took bread, and after he had given thanks, broke it and said, ‘This is my body, which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.’ In the same way, after the supper, he took the cup, saying ‘This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me.’ Every time, then, you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes! (11:23-26). From the earliest days of the Christian community, Christians have gathered to celebrate the Eucharist on Sundays.

From age to age in the Church, the Eucharistic celebration on Sunday has been emphasized as central to the spirituality of the Christian community. Even in recent teachings, the importance of Sunday Mass and participation in it has been underlined. In the Second Vatican Council’s *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy*, the Council Fathers wrote in relation to the promotion of the liturgical life in the diocese and the parish, “Therefore the liturgical life of the parish and its relationship to the bishop must be fostered in the thinking and practice of both laity and clergy; efforts also must be made to encourage a sense of community within the parish, above all in the common celebration of the Sunday Mass” [paragraph 42].

Now that we are about to participate in the Sacred Season of Lent, let us take into mind our participation in Mass, especially on Sundays and days of obligation. Are we present for participation in weekly Sunday Mass? Why or why not? When we do participate, do we do so prayerfully and actively? When we leave Sunday Mass, are we spiritually fed? How can I live my life better through participating in Sunday Mass?

Meet Your New Board of Directors

REV. MSGR. PETER M. POLANDO, NATIONAL CHAPLAIN YOUNGSTOWN, OHIO

Monsignor Polando is beginning his second term on the National Board as Chaplain. He served as President of the Slovak Catholic Federation from 1997 to 2001. Monsignor holds a BA in ecclesiastical and US Histories from St. Gregory Seminary in Cincinnati, OH, an MA in sacred theology from Mount Saint Mary Seminary of the West, Cincinnati, OH; a Master of Arts in liturgical studies from the University of Notre Dame, South Bend, IN; a Master of Arts degree in non-public school administration from Ursuline College in Cleveland, OH; and in May 2007 received a doctoral degree in ministry at the Graduate School of Theology at St. Mary Seminary in Cleveland, OH. Monsignor Polando continued studies in canon law at The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. and received his licentiate in canon law.

His Holiness, Pope John Paul II, conferred the honor of Chaplain of His Holiness upon Monsignor Polando on Palm Sunday, 23 March 1997. In May 1998, the Most Reverend Thomas J. Tobin appointed him to the Board of Mediation and Arbitration for the Diocese of Youngstown's Office of Conciliation.

On 1 July 2003, Bishop Tobin appointed Monsignor Polando Adjutant Judicial Vicar of the Diocese of Youngstown, a position he still maintains. In addition to his pastorate at Saint Matthias Church, the largest Slovak Parish in the Diocese of Youngstown, he was made administrator of Holy Name of Jesus Church in Youngstown in March 2005. Most recently, Monsignor Polando was appointed pastor of the newly merged parishes of Holy Name of Jesus, Saints Cyril and Methodius, and Saint Matthias in Youngstown on 1 August 2011.

He is currently a member of the Youngstown Diocesan Finance Council, the Diocesan Liturgical Commission, and Office of Conciliation having been appointed to these positions by the current bishop of Youngstown, the Most Reverend George V. Murry, S.J.

Monsignor Polando is a Knight of the Holy Sepulchre, having been invested on 18 September 2011 by His Eminence, Francis Cardinal George, Archbishop of Chicago at Holy Name Cathedral. On 9 October 2011, he was awarded the Medal of Honor of the Ambassador of the Slovak Republic to the United States, His Excellency Peter Burian, for his contribution in the preservation of Slovak Heritage and Culture in the United States of America.

Currently he is a member of the Canon Law Society of America and a member of its convention planning committee; secretary/treasurer of the Midwest Canon Law Society; member and immediate past president of the Slovak Catholic Federation; secretary of the Conference of Slovak Clergy; member of the First Catholic Slovak Ladies Association Branch 169; member of the Mahoning Valley Slovak Cultural Association; spiritual moderator of the Youngstown Council of Catholic Nurses; member of Phi Beta Kappa of the University of San Francisco; member of the Notre Dame Club of the Mahoning and Shenango Valleys; a Fourth Degree member of the Knights of Columbus – Bishop James W. Malone Assembly of Youngstown; and, a Third Degree member of the Knights of Columbus — Youngstown Council 274. He is a member of Branch 169.

CYNTHIA M. MALESKI, NATIONAL PRESIDENT BEACHWOOD, OHIO

Cynthia is beginning her first term as National President in January 2012 after two terms as National Trustee (2004-2012).

She has more than 35 years of legal and executive leadership experience, most notably in the insurance and health care industries, as well as in fund management and in the nonprofit sector. Cynthia received her Juris Doctorate with academic excellence from Duquesne University School of Law and her Bachelor of Arts, *summa cum laude*, from the University of Pittsburgh. She is a member of Branch 313, Natrona Heights, PA.

SAINTS CYRIL AND METHODIUS

Feast Day ~ February 14th

They were two Byzantine Greek brothers born in Thessaloniki in the 9th century. They became missionaries of Christianity among the Slavic peoples of Bulgaria, Great Moravia and Pannonia. Through their work they influenced the cultural development of all Slavs, for which they received the title "Apostles to the Slavs".

34th Annual SCF SS. Cyril & Methodius Appeal

When our ancestors came to these shores more than a century ago, they brought with them few monetary assets. However, their most precious possession was their faith. The seeds were nurtured by the Slovak priests who came with the immigrant people and helped build our Slovak Catholic fraternals, religious communities of men and women, and nearly 300 Slovak parishes. Today, in response to this legacy, the Slovak Catholic Federation will sponsor its **34th Annual SS. Cyril & Methodius Appeal**.

The Church in Slovakia has enjoyed a great renaissance since the fall of Communism in 1989. We in America and Canada take pride in the fact that the Slovak Catholic fraternals, our parishes, and individuals of Slovak ancestry have responded generously to assist the Church in our ancestral homeland. The 2012 Annual Appeal begins during the month of February in churches of Slovak descent across The United States and Canada and will continue to the end of the year.

The 2011 Appeal collected \$39,749.25.

Since its inception, this Appeal has raised \$2,272,737.74!

Funds raised from the Appeal will aid the priest-graduate students at the Pontifical Slovak College of SS. Cyril and Methodius. These fine priests are being called upon to be the future leaders of the diocesan churches in Slovakia both as vicars and bishops, in addition to providing qualified instructors/professors for the seminaries that educate future priests. As well, funds benefit those religious communities of both men and women which share a counterpart which belongs to the Slovak Catholic Federation and the Slovak Conference of Religious. These communities include the Vincentian Sisters of Charity (*Ruzomberok*); Dominican Sisters (*Dunajska Luzna*); School Sisters of St. Francis (*Zilina*); Daughters of St. Francis (*Bratislava-Prievoz*); Byzantine Catholic Sisters of St. Basil the Great (*Secove and Presov*), Franciscan Friars Minor (*Bratislava*), and House of St. Benedict (*Bacurov*).

The Slovak Catholic Federation was founded in 1911 under the spiritual leadership of Rev. Joseph Murgas, founding pastor of Sacred Heart of Jesus Slovak Church, Wilkes-Barre, PA. The purpose of the Federation is to federate individuals of Slovak origin under one banner for cultural, religious, and educational needs. Serving as National President is Rev. Philip Altavilla, V.G., Vicar General and Moderator of the Curia of the Diocese of Scranton, PA. The Episcopal Moderator is the Most Rev. Joseph V. Adamec, D.D. The National First Vice President, Rev. Andrew S. Hvozdic, pastor of Epiphany Parish, Sayre, PA, is the coordinator for this annual Appeal.

In our Church today, we are finding that more and more individuals of Slovak descent/background do not attend traditionally founded Slovak parishes, for a number of reasons. Because of this reality today, the monies raised for this Appeal come both from the collections taken in our Slovak parishes as well as from individual donors.



February Favorites!

HEARTY BEEF VEGETABLE SOUP

- 3 cups water with bouillon cubes for beef stock
- 2 cups diced, cooked beef
- 1 (16 oz.) can tomatoes, cut up
- 3 stalks celery, chopped
- 1 large potato, pared and cut into small chunks
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 medium carrot, pared and sliced
- ¾ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon dried thyme, crushed
- ½ teaspoon dried basil, crushed
- ⅛ teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups cooked vegetables: broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, corn, green beans, peas

In 4 quart Dutch oven, combine the beef stock, cooked meat, tomatoes and celery. Add potatoes, onion, and carrot. Add salt, thyme, basil and pepper. Bring to boil, reduce heat. Cover and simmer until vegetables are tender, 20 to 25 minutes. Add the 2 cups cooked vegetables and continue to simmer for 10 minutes.

BLT STEAK SALAD

- One 1-pound flank steak, trimmed
- ¾ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon black pepper
- Nonstick cooking spray
- 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 tablespoon cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 6 cups romaine lettuce, torn into bite-size pieces
- 1 cup halved cherry tomatoes
- 1 small red onion, finely chopped
- ¼ cup crumbled blue cheese
- 2 slices crisp-cooked turkey bacon, crumbled

Sprinkle the steak with ½ teaspoon of the salt and the pepper. Spray a nonstick grill pan with cooking spray and set over medium-high heat. Add the steak and cook 5 minutes on each side for medium-rare. Transfer the steak to a cutting board and let rest for 5 minutes. Cut the steak on an angle against the grain into 12 slices.

Meanwhile, whisk together the oil, vinegar, mustard and remaining ¼ teaspoon salt in a large bowl. Add the lettuce, tomatoes and onions and toss to coat well. Transfer the salad to a platter. Top with the steak slices and sprinkle with the blue cheese and bacon. Serve immediately. Serves 6.

BUTTERNUT ORZO

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 cups peeled, seeded and ½-inch-diced butternut squash (about 1 pound)
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 small onion, diced
- 1½ cups orzo
- ½ cup dry white wine
- 3 cups low-sodium chicken broth
- ⅓ cup grated Parmesan
- ¼ cup half-and-half
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh sage
- Salt and cracked black pepper

Heat the olive oil in a large heavy-bottomed saucepan over medium-high heat. Add the butternut squash and saute until just starting to soften, 5 to 7 minutes. Add the garlic and onions and saute until fragrant and translucent, 2 minutes longer. Add the orzo and continue cooking another 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour in the wine and cook until absorbed.

Gradually add the chicken broth while stirring. Bring to a simmer, cover and cook until the liquid is almost absorbed and the orzo is tender, 8 to 10 minutes. Remove from the heat. Serves 4.

DOUBLE CHOCOLATE-CHIP MUFFINS

- 1¾ cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- 2 tablespoons best quality cocoa powder
- ¾ cup superfine sugar
- ¾ cup semisweet chocolate chips, plus ¼ cup for sprinkling
- 1 cup milk
- ⅓ cup plus 2 teaspoons vegetable oil
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.

Put the flour, baking powder, baking soda, cocoa, sugar, and ¾ cup of the chocolate chips into a large bowl. Pour all

the liquid ingredients into a measuring bowl. Mix the dry and wet ingredients together, remembering that a lumpy batter makes the best muffins. Spoon into the prepared muffin pans. Sprinkle the remaining ¼ cup chocolate chips on top and then bake for 20 minutes or until the muffins are dark, and risen. Makes 12 muffins.

APPLE BREAD PUDDING WITH CARAMEL DESSERT SAUCE

Nonstick cooking spray or butter, for greasing

- 2 cups heavy cream
- 2 cups whole milk
- ¾ cup light brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 9 large egg yolks
- 3½ cups Granny Smith apples, peeled and chopped
- ¾ cup pecans, chopped and toasted
- 1 loaf stale French or Italian bread, cut or torn into 1-inch pieces (preferably stale)
- ¾ cup sugar
- ½ cup unsalted butter
- ½ cup buttermilk
- 1 tablespoon light corn syrup
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- Pinch salt

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 9 x 13-inch baking dish with cooking spray or butter.

In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the heavy cream, whole milk, brown sugar, cinnamon, salt, vanilla and egg yolks and set aside.

Add the cubed apples, pecans and cubed bread to the prepared baking dish and toss to combine. Pour the custard over the bread and apple pieces. Carefully toss to coat, making sure that the cubed bread is submerged in the custard, and let stand to allow the bread to soak up the custard, 10 to 15 minutes.

Bake until the center has set, about 45 minutes. Let cool for 5 minutes. Drizzle Caramel Dessert Sauce over the bread pudding. Serve with extra sauce and vanilla ice cream.

Caramel Dessert Sauce:

In a heavy-bottomed saucepan, combine the sugar, butter, buttermilk and corn syrup. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat and cook for 1 minute. Remove from the heat and slowly add the baking soda (it will foam up), followed by the vanilla and cinnamon. The sauce will thicken as it cools. Serve warm. Serves 8.
